

We recreated our own version right in the shop as we worked to reattach the front axle to the main hulk, aka, Camilla, The Dutchess of Cornwall. (But not before a jolly good fry-up of sausage, bacon, Spam and eggs. Doug knows how to get the best out of us). With the newly installed engine in place and sitting on front axle stands, Camilla was a bit heavy in the nose. We found that with Doug refitting the bolts holding the axle in place, he had just enough clearance if the rest of us, Dan, Ivan and yours truly, stood and/or sat on the very extreme aft end of the flatbed. That raised the nose just enough for it all to fit together nicely.







Let us not point fingers, and just say that we got it backwards. With another major component in place, we turn our efforts to smaller yet no less important bits. With the help of E-bay and UPS, Doug scored a pair of marker lights from Malaysia, and turn signal lenses from some other far corner of this third planet from the sun. 


Headlights and aftermarket tail lights are installed. More small parts are fitted and progress is good. We are motivated by the newspaper advert posted in the shop to keep on with it. We bolt on both master cylinders, cooling fan, heater valve with new handmade gasket, and generator. I adjust the fan belt tension. The radiator is bolted in place and all the hoses attached. Fresh anti-freeze is poured and only a bit leaks out. The offending loose hose clamp is tightened. Engine oil is topped up. We reinstall the speedo, gauges and switches into the freshly painted dash panel, hook up a few wires, and screw the assembly into position.









The carburettor is another matter. We have to devise and adapt a different breathing apparatus. The original, as fitted by BMC, needed replacement. As told in a previous chapter, it appeared to have been sourced from a garden implement. We secured a good, if that is possible, Stromberg carb and fitted it to a Mowog manifold. It was a direct "bolt on" except for the aluminium plate that Doug had to fabricate. Bolts needed to be relocated and heads recessed to allow clearance. The completed unit was offered up and bolted to the head. Meanwhile, Dan painted the air intake plenum that he had straightened using a large hammer.





That's enough for today lads. Same time, same place next week. Or so we thought, until disaster struck. That very next week Doug opted out of the whole ugly mess by injuring himself severely enough that work would have to come to a halt. He was reduced to getting around on crutches and great long bouts of moaning for the next three or four months. As intent and committed as we were to have her there, and needing but the last jerk to the curtain, alas, she would not be ready for the picnic.

Our spirits low, we retired to the barn to figuratively lick our wounds. How would we ever put this behind us? We could have set ourselves to populating the shelf in the shop with empty scotch containers, but just in time someone in our little "C.R.A.P." group suggested that we take over the organizing of the Hougen Park Picnic. This could serve as a distraction from others noticing our failure. Devilish clever.

Planning well underway, time was pressing upon us. The annual picnic is intended to be light and casual, but there is much to do behind the scenes. There is food to co-ordinate, tents and cookers to reserve, dash plaques and trophies to design and order, goody bags to stuff, mole hills to knock down, and a myriad of endless other details to sort out. 
