

Bill McClure's 1275 cc motor is completed ready to fetch into the Morris Minor 1000 to test the brakes



FVCCS Volunteers Wanted

To all Club members,

We need your help for a great cause.

The annual Fraser Valley Classic Car Show is due to be held this year on Sunday, 9 June at the area as before around parking lot # 7 in the University of the Fraser Valley grounds down near the Vedder River in Sardis. Our show will be raising funds again for the Fraser Health Hospital Foundation.

As our Club is the prime organizer, Club members are needed to form teams to help in setting up the site, arranging the parking of the expected 130 to 150 participating cars and for site cleanup at the end of the show. Our set-up and parking teams would need to be on site by 7:00am. Cleanup begins after 3:30. We may have the parking team do some site prep the day before the show.

Team 1: A 4-person team is required to assist in site set-up involving erecting tents and installing boundary ropes, which activities should be completed by 8:00am.

Team 2: A 12-person team is required to install signage for directing arriving show cars and positioning them in the area designated for their Classes, these being pre-1940, 1940's, 1950's on to 1990's. Arrivals are expected to be completed by 10:00am. 2 team members would be required to stay on until 11:00am to deal with late arrivals.

Team 3: Cleanup would require a 4-person team to help take down the signs, boundary rope fencing, garbage pick-up on the field, and pack-up tents, tables, and chairs.



Let me start this episode off with a Mini and a MINI. They are always crowd favourites and never fail to bring a smile to the face of anyone who sees one. Everybody loves them.



Here is an interesting comparison of the two generations. One is rather small, yet really quite roomy, while the other is even smaller. They both have spirited performance, get excellent gas mileage and are great fun to drive. Some people believe that the new MINI is not British, arguing that it is of German/BMW design. That is true, but the car is built in England and that qualifies as British. I must point out that the designer of the original Mini for BMC, Alec Issigonis, was born in Sanyma, Turkey, the product of a Greek father and a Bavarian mother. He moved to England as a child. Does that make the original Mini Turkish?









This seemingly "abandoned in a field" Mini photo was taken years ago in Mission. It might look reasonably good from a distance but a closer inspection reveals otherwise. Seats don't look too bad,



This nest of Minis is just across the pasture from the shots of the blue Countryman/delivery. Here is a nice and tidy collection. Cars awaiting adoption. Lots of spares. How can you not want to take one home. This location has long since disappeared, but I believe some of this cache has remained local.

The car was a going concern with current plates when I first stumbled upon it. Sometime later it was up on blocks with the wheels off. It sat like that for quite awhile. A "For Sale" sign appeared on the house, and it disappeared. The car, not the house.



Here is another GT from the same period. It is a Triumph GT6 in primrose. Very nice. This car was out on a farm in Greendale. I never saw it on the road but it was often seen at this location. One day as I drove past the area I was greeted with a rather disturbing sight. The barn next to the enclosure that the Triumph called home had burned to the ground. Fiberglass body For Sale

It was professionally made in England to fit a lengthened GT6/Spitfire chassis but, decided that it was just as easy to modify a Spitfire chassis to period 'twin tube' style and retain the Triumph front crossmember, suspension and steering. The body is styled after the period Ferrari, Maserati, HWM and Frazer Nash cars of about 1950. It could also be used to build a "Stovebolt Special" if you have a spare V8 lying around.

Body has been professionally modified to accommodate a longer six cylinder engine and added a door for the driver! Wheelbase is 8 feet approx.

The body has had a huge amount of work done to finish the edges etc so that it will be almost impossible to tell it is not aluminium-the bonnet is aluminium-the grill is not for sale! Body only I am asking \$3500 obo (It cost a lot more than that)!
